

To a dear friend of Forgotten Cats,



It's grueling work. Many of the cats who come to our clinics through our trap-neuter-vaccinate-return program are broken physically and emotionally and require extensive rehabilitation before they are ready to be released or adopted. For many of them, Forgotten Cats' clinic will be the only time they receive medical care in their life – drastically improving their quality of life and giving them a fighting chance.

One of the most heartbreaking realities of our work is that many of these cats were pets at one time, and their trust in humans makes them more vulnerable to cruelty. Over this past year, our vets – in addition to routine services like neutering/spaying and vaccinating each cat – have set broken bones, removed unrepairable broken legs and tails, and extracted darts, BB pellets and glass intentionally embedded in their tiny bodies. They have also removed tumors, gouged eyes, and treated burns and abscesses that no doubt would become infected and could lead to a slow and painful death if left on the streets.

Forgotten Cats must continue to help the cats who truly have been forgotten. Without us, they have no one.

Unlike with other pets, there are no laws or funding to address the needs of homeless cats. Our operation takes an enormous amount of manpower and money. Our 700+ volunteers perform much of the work that most shelters employ people to do so that every penny we receive can go directly to rescue.

Maggie's Story

Maggie hides in the shadows of the alley light. Her black and white fur is drenched and her paws near-frozen as she tries to shield her five kittens from the freezing December winds. Her eyes are heavy, her stomach burning from hunger as her kittens suckle for hours because she is too emaciated to satisfy them. She can barely lift her head, exhausted from the never-ending burden of scavenging for food and searching for a warm shelter for her kittens – even if just for one night. How will she get through the winter? How will she get the strength to survive even one more day?

It is hard to imagine that sweet Maggie, now only 9 months old, was someone's pet a short time ago. When her family moved away, they simply left her outside – abandoning her and leaving her to live a life of misery.

The sad truth is that Maggie is only one of hundreds of thousands of cats forgotten by their families and ignored by society as just another stray cat. When people see her, many mistakenly assume she belongs outside or prefers to be there – that she's just doing what cats do. But for many like Maggie, they never wanted to be here. They don't know how to survive out here.

That cold December night, Maggie closed her eyes for the last time. Her kittens remained with her, waiting and crying for her to awaken. It was only when their hunger became so unbearable that their cries were heard by one of the many compassionate Forgotten Cats volunteers. They were given food, a warm shelter and a new chance at a loving home, but for Maggie, the help came too late.
