From One Volunteer to Another

In talking about service to others, Winston Churchill once said, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give."

I've often thought about how Forgotten Cats has changed my life and helped me create a life filled with meaningful service, rewards, and yes, challenges. I started several years ago volunteering at the Jenkintown PetSmart adoption center and found my way to the clinic. I've done feed and clean, worked in recovery, done trapping, opened the Pottstown Adoption Center, and recruit, train, and schedule volunteers at Willow Grove.

As the volunteer coordinator, I've met amazing people who have inspired me to grow, not only in my knowledge of cats, but in my service to others and as a human being.

I've heard from many volunteers their reasons for volunteering: some love animals and are passionate about making a difference. Others are retired, and instead of kicking back, have chosen the trenches of hard and often heartbreaking work in our shelter and clinic. Many juggle jobs, children, disabled and ill relatives, and multiple responsibilities to volunteer a few hours a week. Still others are dealing with a personal loss or tragedy, and their service to animals gives them a sense of purpose and the knowledge that they helped at least one life breathe easier.

As Felicia reminds us, volunteers are the heart of our organization. Our accomplishments include sterilizing over 100,000 and adopting out over 10,000 cats. The numbers, however, don't tell the incredible stories of individuals rescued from the mean streets, homeless cats placed into loving homes, and tragically unwanted births prevented. This is what our volunteers do every day.

As our WG friend Susan Zimmerman says, "We are only as good as our volunteers." We want to improve what we do. We strive to educate ourselves, to grow in our knowledge and management and practices. We learn from our mistakes.

As an organization, our stakeholders are obviously the cats, their caretakers, and the public, but also our volunteers. Volunteer retention is a huge problem for animal rescues and shelters. Research shows that if volunteers quit, it's usually in the first month. The reasons are varied. Other volunteers leave after years, suffering frustration and burnout. It's a well-known phenomenon that volunteers in shelters and animal rescue, unlike other volunteer opportunities, experience profound stress, feelings of being overwhelmed, and guilt over not being able to save them all. This is known as compassion fatigue.

How can we attract and retain volunteers? Why do we stay? Looking at my own experience, the things that keep me going are: finding a specific thing that I can do well and enjoy doing, seeing the big picture of our organization, hearing success stories, and building community with other volunteers. We must help our volunteers, new and seasoned, to learn, grow, and find a place with Forgotten Cats. We must bring in new people, so they can learn and help our organization grow.

As the animal advocate and writer Cleveland Armory observed, "anyone who has ever been around a cat for any length of time well knows, cats have enormous patience with the limitations of



the humankind."

My message is this: to help the cats, be patient with ourselves, support one another, and continue learning. The cats depend on each and every one of you, and together we can work to make a better world for them and ourselves.
